Dear Chris and Republican Women of the Central Coast,

As Superintendent! Principal at Cayucos Elementary School I am very grateful that the Republican Women of the Central Coast graciously decided to assist our school with a \$400.00 donation to allow us to provide additional enrichment opportunities for our students. It was a pleasure talking to Chris Holmberg about the objectives of your Board and the areas you would like to see supported.

As per this conversation I would like to submit to the EBRWF the following list of supported activities in four enrichment areas:

- 1. Drama: \$100.00 will go toward the purchase of costumes and props for our annual Christmas Play in December. It will add significantly to the quality and scope of our play which includes students from 1 st to 8th grades.*
- 2. Art: Our 6-7-8 grade art elective will use their \$100.00 to purchase specialized paints to complete a "Paint America" map on our playground. It will be a full map of the USA drawn to scale which the students will complete with their teacher.*
- 3. PE: The \$100.00 for PE will provide 3 playground balls and 3 jump ropes for each classroom grades K through 5 as we were very short on playground equipment this year. A healthy mind and a healthy body are both very important.*
- 4. Music: The final \$100.00 will be spent on additional sheet music and CDs for our instrumental, choral and classroom music programs.*

To date we have spent \$377.75 for the enrichment above. I am certain that we can also find appropriate expenditures for the remaining \$22.25. We thank the EBRWF and invite the entire membership to visit our newly built school for a tour at any time. It would be my pleasure to show off our programs and facilities.

Multi-Billion Dollar Deficit Projected for CA

*Reforms Are Needed to Fix Government, but Not at
the Expense of Taxpayer Protections*

The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) recently released its annual Fiscal Outlook for the 2010-2011 budget years that starts in July. As you may have heard, the report did not paint a pretty picture about California's finances. The LAO projects that there is a \$20.7 billion deficit between now and the end of the 2010-2011 budget year. The LAO's forecast makes it clear that California's budget remains structurally imbalanced.

California is lagging behind most states on the road to economic recovery. The Legislature must correct the punitive regulatory and tax climate that is driving jobs away and hurting state revenue. California's state government is ripe for reforms to fix the dysfunction and the Legislature needs to improve efficiency and accountability in government, and cut down on the layers of bureaucracy.

The Senate and Assembly's Select Committees on Improving State Government are holding hearings throughout the state on how to reform California's lawmaking process. The Committees are comprised of both Republicans and Democrats, and are evaluating major proposals to reform the Legislature and its broken budget system.

Some of the ideas that were discussed in the committee include:

- Incorporating longer-term planning in budget decisions to reduce the boom and bust nature of economic cycles;
- Exploring performance-based budgeting to encourage efficiency and reward programs that are working;
- Reducing the number of bills that lawmakers can introduce each year so that

the Legislature focuses on the most important of state priorities;

- Elevating the importance of sub-committees, rather than having major decisions made by the "Big 5"; and
- Combining legislative panels that have similar duties to reduce duplication and inefficiency.

California can't afford to miss an opportunity to overhaul state government because the process is dominated by opportunists wanting to eliminate or weaken hard-fought taxpayer protections; there are special interests and others out there who view any reform movement as an opportunity to make it easier to defy the will of the people and increase taxes and spending.

Specifically, if they are to be effective, true reform proposals must: preserve taxpayer protections, including the two-thirds majority vote needed to raise taxes and pass a budget; protect the right of the people to take back their government at the ballot box through the initiative and referendum process if and when lawmakers fail to act; and ensure that elected officials remain true representatives of the people and that effective term limits placed on lawmakers are not repealed or weakened.

I hope that my fellow legislators will work with me to solve this problem quickly, because the sooner we can implement the necessary reforms, the sooner we can realize the benefits.

Conservative Values "A Time For Choosing"

There is a great problem today with the general public understanding Conservative values. They don't seem to understand the true definition of Conservatism. And, today's Republican Party is certainly not helping the matter any, for one is hard-pressed to find a Reagan Conservative these days--at least amongst politicians.

Up until 1964, former President Reagan, one of the greatest Presidents we have ever seen in this nation, was a Democrat. This is not as surprising as it may seem **too many people today.** Ronald Reagan had been in radio and in Hollywood before he discovered his true calling of politics (he became the governor of California from 1967 through 1975). We who have values today know that the mental disease known as liberalism has long since infested Hollywood and the mass media. Reagan in his younger years was obviously influenced by this trend amongst those within his profession. But, he was a man of strong intelligence, and eventually he started to check the facts. And the facts about how his nation was being run disturbed him so deeply that he couldn't remain on the side of the Democrats, and he became a Republican, although he still insisted throughout his political life that Americans' issues were beyond those of "left" and "right". His Liberal Democrat opponents never got tired of mocking this idea of his, and they aren't tired of mocking it now even more than four years after his death.

And this could be summed up by a couplet from the great Neoclassical poem "Essay on Man" by Alexander Pope: "Be not the first by which the new is tried, Nor the last to set the old aside."

Ronald Reagan - A Time for Choosing

An address given to the Republican National Convention on October 27, 1964.

Liberals seem to believe that money grows on trees. Of course, it's like Cullen Hightower would say: There's always somebody who makes too much money and is taxed too little. And the thing of it is, it's always somebody else. So that money tree somehow always seems to be growing in a Conservative's yard...and, of course, that Conservative somehow stole it and now uses it for unjust ends, such as putting food on his family's table and maybe buying himself a new sedan car (if the Liberal had the money tree, he would buy a new BMW and then ask other people to help him make the payments).

Reagan Conservatives are those who don't compromise their values. The Republican party needs that these days...yet it seems difficult to find them. Republicans also need someone who can actually orate--someone who is not like a McCain. The Democrats seem to find plenty of skilled salesmen for their cause...but the Republicans are the ones who need them.

But, let me try to do that for you here, at least to an extent. What are Conservative values?

- Conservative values are backed up by historical precedent, logically derived principles, and prudence (practicality). Conservatives love facts. Liberals, Socialists, Communists, and Islamic fundamentalist terrorists hate facts, because to them facts are pernicious things that get in the way of a good ideology--and their irresponsible actions.
- Speaking of facts, anyone who checks into them will fairly quickly learn that it's Conservatives who make up the intellectual party in politics. Liberals co-opted--that is, stole--that concept in order to grab power.

- Conservatives understand that outside of running the military and other related protective services, the government, either federal or state, simply cannot achieve what private, capitalist free market based industry achieves. Government is not reason, government is not the embodiment of any higher moral authority. Government at its very best is a necessary evil. At its worst, it is completely evil. But it is never, ever rational or moral. It is a force. And that is why it must be kept strictly limited and in check.
- Conservatives understand that any "liberal" values must be expressed privately. They cannot be ensconced as federal laws or economic ideals. They don't work in that way. If everyone is free, how can you force a large amount of people to accept freedom? You can't. It's really very simple.
- Conservatives understand that you don't get something for nothing. When the government increases spending and entitlement programs and "bailouts", it is just stealing money from private citizens--and using that money in ways that are inefficient at best and downright harmful at worst.
